There is a warning in the New Testament that reads, "Flee these things."

It was Paul who gave this warning. Was he warning of a tsunami, a rabid dog, an infectious plague or a fire? No. He was warning of something far more treacherous. Paul said, and I paraphrase, "Run for your life from the lust for money and from those who teach that security lies in how much wealth you can horde."

Jesus warned against the same thing. He called it. . .

Mark 4:19 (NIV)

19 the worries of this life, the deceitfulness of wealth and the desires for other things. . .

The deceitfulness of money is like a psychotic disease that blinds one to eternal values. It lulls one into trusting money as his or her source of security.

Believe it or not, in America, money comes with a warning label.

The inscription "In God We Trust" first appeared on our coins nearly 150 years ago. That was a time when our nation was being torn apart by the ravages of civil war. Paul tells us. . .

12 Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called.

The irony of it all is—if we lust for money, we can and often will self-destruct. But pursuing what is listed in verses 11 and 12 brings contentment and ultimately great gain. (See 1 Timothy 6:6 and Matthew 6:33.)
